

ONE HUNDREDTH ANNUAL MEETING

On the evening of June 9, 1979, students and faculty, of all ages and from all over the United States and Europe, once again filled the Tallmadge High School Auditorium to celebrate the Tallmadge High School Alumni Association's 100th Annual Meeting. A celebration it was indeed. The gymnasium was decorated in the tradition blue and gold. Each table was adorned with blue and gold. Marigolds at each plate were wrapped in blue as favors for each guest. The room was filled with over 260 Alumni and guests. The largest turnout anyone could remember.

The Social Hour began at 6:00 PM, as Alumni and guests greeted each other with lots of hugs and tears; hand shakes and smiles. Laughing and reminiscing of old times could be heard all evening.

The sit-down dinner of Swiss Steak, Baked Potatoe, Tossed Salad, Mixed Vegetables, and all the trimmings, was catered by Stroup's of Akron. All during the Social Hour and through Dinner piano music was provided by Miss Gina Hersek, daughter of Paul Hersek (1951), who delighted the Alumni.

President Robert Crislip (1948) welcomed the Alumni and Guests. He also thanked everyone who came for the great turn out for our Centennial Celebration. President Crislip then introduced the head table.

The invocation was given by First Vice President JoAnn Stem Wood (1948).

After dinner, we all relaxed as the tables were cleared to begin our meeting.

The 50 year class was honored and introduced by Laura Limbert Jones. Those in attendance were, Helen Bloom Craig, Annetta Ayer Falor, Laura Limbert Jones, Marion Upson Rasp, Elmer Sloat, Horation Spriggle - President of the class, and Burton Waldorf. Laura Limbert Jones recalled that her class graduated on May 24, 1929. There were 18 members in her class; nine were girls and nine were boys. Their motto was "Out of Life into school". Each member was introduced to the association and told about their families and where they are now living. They were all very proud of Tallmadge High School and happy to be in attendance.

President Crislip then ordered the official COUNTDOWN 100 to take place. And just as at the end of a football game or the launch of a space ship the Alumni counted down 10 - 9 - 8 - 7 - 6 - 5 - 4 - 3 - 2 - 1 !! The Centennial meeting was officially greeted with a large round of applause.

NEW BUSINESS

Frank E. Lawrence (1912) noted that 29% of the first 79 Tallmadge High School graduates were still living.

TALLMADGE SCHOOL CHRONOLOGY

By Harriett McEuen

1810 First Log School.

1814-15 Frame building housed the common school and academy. District schools as needed from 1810 to 1916.

1870 Center School District formed June 11.

1871 Center School built.

1876 Center School burned in January and reopened September 5. Housed three levels, one of which was the high school under the tuition of Miss Martha Maltby. Tallmadge Academy discontinued.
High School Courses offered: Spelling, Defining, Grammar, Composition, Literature, Authors, Essays, Elocution, Arithmetic (Practical and Mental); Algebra A & B, Geometry: Accounting; Physical Geography, Universal History, American History; Constitution; Beginning Latin; Roman History; Caesar; Philosophy; Physiology; Botany; Specimen.

1879 Eight students graduated April 25. Louis Atwood, Fannie E. Kerr, Ida B. Limbert, Lottie Limbert, Nettie Peck, Anna Seward, Francis L. Sperry, and Hattie Webb.

1883 1885....1889....No graduating class.

1884 As was customary, each graduate was required to write, memorize, and recite a speech at Commencement. Because there were 18 in the class, it was necessary to schedule an all day program. This practice was discontinued in 1913.

1911 New Central building, built of brick, occupied November 7.

1914 Four-year plan introduced for high school.

1915 Domestic science and manual training first offered for those who did not take the Latin course. School reorganization provided eight elementary grades and four high school grades.

1916 Outlying district schools suspended and all students attended the Center School. High school given a first class rating by the State Department of Education. Wagons purchased to transport students to the Center.

1917 Medical inspections introduced in the schools.

1920 School wired for electricity.

1922 Community civics and vocational civics added to curriculum.

1923 New high school building completed. (Southwest unit of present Central Junior High.)

1926 District has six horse drawn school wagons and seven motor busses.

1929 Athletic field named to honor Fred E. Ayer, a president of Tallmadge Board of Education, Dean of College of Engineering at University of Akron.

1930 Radio purchased for school.

1931 Telephone placed in principal's office. (This party-line arrangement was reported very unsatisfactory in 1935.)

1932 Because of "The Depression," school was held for eight months for elementary students. High school continued for nine months, but the teachers taught two weeks without pay.

1933 First school newspaper "The Rambler."

1935 Commercial course introduced. Purchase of motion pictor projector for school use.

1936 Tallmadge Township became an incorporated village.

1937 Film library established.

1940 Bell telephone system installed.

1946 Band Boosters organized and band wore uniforms.

1949 Overdale athletic field opened.

1950 Dunbar School dedicated October 25.

1951 Tallmadge became a city and schools became the Tallmadge City School District. Driver Education classes introduced.

1953 Overdale opened for classes November 16.

1956 Art classes added to curriculum.

1960 D.E. (Distributive Education) course first offered. Present High School building on East Avenue dedicated.

1962 Jean Pierre Behrin arrived as first foreign exchange student. Munroe School opened.

1963 First classes for D.C.T. (Diversified Cooperative Training).

1964 Central Junior High building dedicated April 12.

1966 O.W.E. (Occupational Work Experience) and C.O.E. (Cooperative Office Experience) courses introduced. David Bacon School dedicated October 9.

1970 Tallmadge became a part of the Vocational Compact which includes Cuyahoga Falls, Hudson, Kent, Stow, and Woodridge districts.

1973 Open House on October 28 for the new Educational Service Center.

1974 Commencement ceremonies moved from Tallmadge to E. J. Thomas Performing Arts Hall.

1979 Career Education Program initiated in the Tallmadge City Schools.
323 Seniorsegraduating.

President Crislip presented Mrs. Harriett McEuen with a check from Tallmadge High School Alumni Association for Project 22. The High School is celebrating 100 years of Tallmadge High School and they are making a park outside the Hexagon building and planting the area with oak trees and putting in picnic tables and benches. It is call Project 22 because the students who participate each donate:

20 Hours of time
+ 2 Dollars

Project 22

Wallace Wood (1948) presented the slate of officers selected by the Nominating Committee. President Crislip asked for nominations from the floor. None were given. Motion was made and seconded to accept the slate of officers given by the nominating committee. Motion passed.

President Crislip then turned the gavel over to the new President, JoAnn Stem Wood (1948).

The new 1979-1980 officers were introduced by President JoAnn Stem Wood.

President Wood thanked everyone for coming and those people who planned the banquet. She also reminded everyone to take the marigold favors home with them.

Meeting adjorned 9:10 PM.

The Tallmadge High School Stage Band performed as many of the guests danced their way into the night.
